In the news

Crown Commercial Service partnership with NHS England

The Crown Commercial Service <u>announced a partnership</u> with NHS England to centralise energy purchasing. The transition to centralised purchasing will enable value for money efficiencies and allow the NHS to reinvest into frontline services and patient care.

Mental health unit is the first in the country to be all-electric

Set to open its doors in 2024, Greater Manchester Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust have constructed the nation's first all-electric mental health unit.

Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) environmental sustainability statement

In September 2023, the HCPC published a <u>sustainability statement</u> setting out its commitment to become an environmentally sustainable regulator.

National reports and guidance

Sustainability reporting in the NHS 2023/24 and beyond

As part of the HFMA's suite of material to support members during the year-end accounts and audit, we have updated our <u>briefing on sustainability reporting</u>. This briefing sets out the NHS environmental sustainability commitments and reporting requirements across the United Kingdom, what NHS organisations must report in 2023/24, and good practice in sustainability reporting for NHS organisations in 2023/24 and beyond.

New to the requirements this year, NHS bodies that have more than 500 full-time equivalent employees or have a total operating income of more than £500m will be required to comply with the first of three phases of the Task Force on Climate-related Financial Disclosures (TCFD). These requirements have been incorporated into the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) <u>Group Accounting Manual (GAM)</u> 2023/24 and NHS foundation trust annual reporting manual 2023/24 updates.

NHS audit committee handbook

In March we published the <u>NHS audit committee handbook</u>. Chapter 20.4 discusses the developments in environmental, social and corporate governance for monitoring.

On the subject of TCFD...

We have also commented on <u>HM Treasury's phase two exposure draft for TCFD</u> with a specific focus on the areas of the draft that relate to NHS bodies. Phase two of the application guidance sets out the recommended disclosures for risk management and metrics and targets pillars of the TCFD framework. Largely, we support the changes to better reflect the public sector contexts overall, are broadly supportive of the exposure draft, and welcome consistency and clarity over sustainability reporting in the public and private sector

Sustainability is critical for future proofing the NHS

The BMJ published an <u>article</u> discussing the importance of placing sustainability at the core of the NHS to deliver better services, support healthier populations and save costs. Six recommendations for a sustainable NHS were made:

- 'Develop and invest in data, metrics, and research that drive NHS sustainability and integrate climate risk'
- 'Implement transparent, accountable national adaptation strategies'
- 'Implement sustainable interventions across infrastructure, technology, transport, food, and waste'
- 'Educate, embed, and build networks for sustainability through the NHS workforce'
- 'Promote nature and action on the environmental determinants of health'
- 'Ensure decisive and visionary NHS leadership, governance, and investment'

Regarding educating, embedding and building networks for sustainability through the NHS workforce...

The IEMA and Nature Positive have launched some practical <u>guidance and tools</u> to help non-executive directors (NEDs) understand the sustainability risks and challenges that face the NHS and how sustainability can be incorporated into their role.

A key issue for sustainability in the NHS is climate change and decarbonisation

In February, The Department for Energy Security and Net Zero <u>announced</u> that Phase 4 of the Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme (PSDS) would be delivered by Salix Finance with a funding pot of £1.17 billion for public sector decarbonisation. Published guidance for phase 4 is expected later this summer.

As reported by NHS England's <u>Carbon reduction plan and net zero commitment requirements for the</u> <u>procurement of NHS goods, services and works,</u> from April 2024 the NHS has proportionately extended the

Carbon Reduction Plan (CRP) requirements to cover all new procurements through a two tiered approach – a full CRP and a net zero commitment. Please see their report for further details.

Last updated in May 2024, to estimate their net carbon footprint, including direct and indirect emissions, the Welsh Government provide a public sector net zero *reporting guide and reporting spreadsheet*.

Other reports and guidance since our last update

Centre for Sustainable Healthcare (CSH)

CSH have an active <u>blog</u> presence. Their May <u>post</u> highlighted that a <u>green team competition</u> was run in partnership with the Great Ormond Street Hospital for Children NHS Foundation Trust to improve the sustainability of services. The competition entries have an anticipated annual savings to the Trust of £284,098 and 4,797 kgCO2e. The winning team – pharmacy's <u>Kapsule Kids</u>, which focused on empowering children to switch from liquid to tablet medications – projected to bring £258,255 in financial savings alone. Increasing cycling business mileage rates at Sheffield Children's NHS Foundation Trust For Sheffield Children's NHS Foundation Trust travel related activities account for 11% of their total carbon footprint. This <u>article</u> from Greener NHS explores the way the trust addressed this challenge by increasing the cycling milage claim rates to match driving claim rates (56p/mile). HFMA environmental sustainability guidance map

Updated in May, the <u>HFMA NHS environmental sustainability guidance map</u> brings together the key guidance, tools and examples to support the NHS in meeting its commitments to environmental sustainability.

Training

There are several sustainability training opportunities available including the following:

- Net zero building standard training: e-learning to support NHS estates and facilities teams and their supply chain to prepare for the UK government building requirements set out in the <u>Net zero</u> building standard.
- Carbon literacy project: personal or organisation wide <u>training</u> to provide the skills and knowledge to bridge the gap between climate change policy and action. Until October 2026 NHS organisations in England can access the Healthcare toolkit material for free.
- The Centre for Sustainable Healthcare (CSH): CSH works with NHS trusts to integrate sustainability into quality improvement. CSH has freely available resources such as net zero leadership training for boards; step-by-step project resources; educator pack; add-aninute introductory e-learning session.
- Sustainability leadership for greener health and care programme: The NHS Leadership Academy's <u>sustainability leadership for greener health and care programme</u> is free for NHS staff and is designed to develop leadership abilities, giving leaders the tools and knowledge to build a greener, more sustainable health system.
- **ICAEW sustainability certificate:** The <u>ICAEW sustainability certificate</u> aims to equip finance professionals with the practical knowledge and skills to integrate sustainability reporting into their organisations.

- ACCA certificate in sustainability for finance: recognising that finance professionals have an
 important part in helping organisations adapt to sustainable practices the ACCA has a certificate in
 sustainability for finance.
- Environmental, social and governance (ESG) courses: AICPA and CIMA have a <u>fundamentals</u> of <u>ESG certificate</u>, to help accounting and finance professionals embrace ESG.

Coming autumn 2024

The LDN Sustainable Healthcare Academy

In collaboration with Greener NHS, the Centre for Sustainability and others, LDN Apprenticeships have built the <u>Sustainable Healthcare Academy</u>. This academy was designed to enhance the skills and capability of NHS professionals who have an active role in NHS Green Plans and other sustainability initiatives.

Launching in the autumn, the apprenticeship programme has a curriculum tailored for the sector, and as it is levy-funded, there will be no commercial cost to learners or employers. The programme uses a cohort model where learners will collaborate with peers across the NHS ecosystem (finance, HR, procurement, pathology etc) and learning is offered through blended delivery - digital learning, 1-2-1 coaching and peer collaboration.

GreenED

GreenED is an <u>initiative</u> to measure and reduce the environmental impact of emergency departments and is the first sustainability framework designed specifically for the secondary care setting. Divided into levels the framework outlines evidence-based action and provides guidance and resources to contribute to net zero targets, create financial savings and maintain or improve patient care. The initiative is currently closed for registration, but capacity will be reviewed in September 2024.
